## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Members,

This past June I had the honor of attending the AAUW 2015 National Convention in San Diego. I can honestly say that it was the best conference I have ever attended! What an inspiration. Barb Kanning, Mary Lou Thomas, Phyllis Thompson and I attended some wonderful workshops and listened to excellent speakers. I thank the branch for sending me to such a valuable conference.

Voting for the 2015 Election also wrapped up while we were in San Diego. Here is a brief recap of the election results (you can also find this on the website:

Our national AAUW Board of Directors are:

**Board Chair:** Patricia Fae Ho, **Board Vice Chair:** Alicia Hetman, Board Finance Vice Chair: Janet Bunger (appointed), **Board Secretary:** Eileen S. Hartmann, **Directors:** Joanna Amberger (appointed), Susan Barley, Malinda Gaul, Anthony J. Hill (appointed), Ellie Hill, Traci Jensen, Melissa Johnsen, Dot McLane, Rebecca Norlander, Glenda D. Price, and Pam Thiel.

Voting was at 12% overall and our Indiana voting percentage came in at 8.45% (which means only 85 of our 1,006 members voted).

All the Bylaws passed except for the one which proposed eliminating the degree requirement. Those that passed were: filling board vacancies, changing leadership titles, the vice president term, and committee member terms. The four

that passed did so with more that 80% of the vote. The proposal to eliminate the degree requirement saw the following results: Yes to eliminate at 40.91%, No to eliminate at 55.51% with 3.58% not voting on the issue.

Twelve Public Policy initiatives were up for vote and all passed. A brief description of the topics voted upon are: 1) Women and other underrepresented populations, 2) High-quality public education free from sexual assault, 3) Safe housing; reproductive health care, 4) Campaign finance reform; fair elections, 5) Diversity and inclusion, 6) Placement of ERA and campaign finance reform language, 7) Arts and humanities, 8) Ratification of CEDAW, 9) National priorities, 10) Title IX enforcement, 11) Health care access, and 12) Passage of ERA.

I am looking forward to a great year which starts with our first event to be held on August 26<sup>th</sup> – the 95<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the passing of the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment: **Women's Right to Vote!** This event will be held at the YWCA and our branch is joining with the YWCA, Women's Bureau and the League of Women Voters to show the screening of the documentary, Iron Jawed Angels. The movie will start at 6pm and refreshments will be served beginning at 5:30pm. If interested, RSVP to Sue Hiatt at (260) 424-4908. I hope to see you there and all the other upcoming programs.
