Voting and Advocacy

This year we have the opportunity to vote in two elections. This is a right that many in our world don't have but that far too many people in our nation take for granted. That's one reason why I am a member of the League of Women Voters.

Women's rights have been on the top of my "interest list" ever since I graduated from college and began my career. I had no idea when Mastercard sent me a credit card (that I did not request) that keeping that card in my own name and separate from my spouse would be so difficult. Apparently MC thought I had the brains to handle my debt if I was single but not when I married.

This was just the first of a number of eye-opening experiences of my twenties that occurred from 1974 onward. Needless to say, I learned how to write some pretty pointed letters and who best to complain to if I didn't get an adequate response. I had no idea our society didn't respect women any more than it did at that time...and still doesn't in far too many instances. Thus my interest in politics as it affects the female gender.

I think that in all my years of voting, there has been only one election that I have missed—a primary because we were moving out of state at that time. But a mayoral race, governor's race, House & Senate on both the state and national level, city council and President—I'm there. I even worked for the Allen County Election Board one election.

So where is this leading? Well, for one thing, Bobbie Weikle did us a big favor by handing out the Advocacy Check List at our holiday brunch. There are lots of ways to be involved and you don't always have to leave the house to participate. If you write a letter to an elected official about an issue you are concerned with, you will, for the most part, get a response that gives you some background on the issue. This is information you likely won't get in a news report.

And you may also get a few sentences from your rep about why they believe the way they do and these will give you a look into how they think. I'm still trying to figure out a tactful response to a comment about women's health care that makes no sense to me whatsoever.

So, look at that Advocacy Checklist and keep it handy this year.

Just as important is voting, and the LWV will definitely be out promoting voting in 2024. We have a website— Vote411.org—where we send candidates questions which they answer without our editing so that you can compare answers between the D's and the R's and anyone else running who thinks responding to voters is important. The site also gives you information on how to register to vote, where to vote, early voting, etc.

Please check out Vote411.org as we get closer to the primary (and the general election) and share this resource widely. Indiana voters don't have the best track record when it comes to voting participation, but we can change that if we all get involved with promoting why voting is important.

Also look for AAUW's Two Minute Activist which will keep you "in the know" about issues directly affecting women.

If you're a reader, invest in Heather Cox Richardson's new book "Democracy Awakening". If it's been some time since you've taken a history class, you'll appreciate her bringing you up to date on politics and our government since the Reagan administration.

Book Review: Persist by Senator Elizabeth Warren

If you are thoroughly disheartened by the current political affairs of today, please resist the negativity and listen to the inspiring audio (or read the book) version of "Persist", by Senator Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts. Listening to her actually read her own book to you is inspiration in itself, whether or not you agree with her political opinions. She is passionate about helping improve the lives of women in a way that you will only understand through listening to her read the book. She speaks about six perspectives that have influenced her thinking about life and her persistent advocacy for improving people's lives.

First, she was teaching and found she had no job because of her pregnancy. She was a professor at Harvard and thinking ahead, she realized that things were running amok in the banking and loan industries. She began talking with anyone who would listen about the problems that she foresaw for people paying mortgages and the direction the country was headed. Fast forward to the Bush II administration. The housing mortgage bubble burst because banks made huge loans to unqualified borrowers which sent the stock market tumbling. Other Western nations did the same thing.

In her book, "Persist", you realize that this woman has learned a lot from all the "selfie" pictures and more during her campaign/run for President in 2020. Her tenacity is something that anyone who has grown up trying to fight for the rights of women will definitely be inspired by reading or listening to this book.

Period Poverty

In January you may have read an article on Period Poverty in the Op-Ed pages of the Journal-Gazette written by Leslie Patterson. Leslie is an officer of NOW and an active volunteer for Madvoters of Indiana.

In her recent piece, Ms. Patterson shares the sad facts about the challenges that women and girls face each month, especially if you are a girl that lives in poverty or finds challenges presented by some cultural norms or beliefs around women's menstruation.

Over a woman's lifetime, if she has a period for 40 years, she will have spent well over \$5,600 on Feminine Hygiene Products (FHP) – including the Indiana "luxury tax" imposed by our IN lawmakers. Programs like WIC or SNAP do not cover FHP and are often cashed in to purchase these needed items. When products are not available for a variety of reasons, women often wear protection longer than is healthy, often resulting in a variety of health issues that sometimes lead to mental health issues.

As a result of these initiatives, I have arranged to meet with Leslie, a department chair at Parkview and have contacted FWCS and the Red Cross so that we have a further understanding of local needs and challenges. I will also plan to take advantage of the AAUW grant process to help address this critical need by the girls and women in this area. A local official within the FWCS nursing department told me that they get over 10,000 requests annually for FHP. She believes that that number is a little low since nurses are incredibly busy during the school day and may not log every request.

Stay tuned for further updates as I move through this process. It is my sincere hope that our AAUW members will support these efforts as we continue to support women and girls that have the greatest needs.

Transportation costs about \$500 per student to either fly or drive, which is money few students have these days.

As we all know, things have gotten more expensive, and most wage increases are far from offsetting the inflation. While our branch is applying for funds from the state AAUW and other sources, it is likely that there will still be a gap for transportation costs. Would you consider contributing a donation to help with transportation to and from NCCWSL? Whether you are able to donate or not, be proud of the role we as AAUW play in changing women's lives, in lots of ways. After all, what better reason to do what we do?
