Thoughts from your President

Hello friends,

In the last newsletter I talked about being an advocate and a mentor for other women in the workforce, to help them advocate for themselves and their earning power.

This month I want to talk about the federal and state government policies and actions since the beginning of this year. To be clear, what I am referring to are the public acts by our elected officials, particularly within the executive branch. This is not to be construed as advocacy for or against any political party, but rather the events unfolding before us since Donald Trump became president.

Since the presidential inauguration and the inception of DOGE led by Elon Musk, we have seen multiple government agencies' staffing slashed, the U.S. Department of Education has even attempted to be dismantled and now Social Security benefits are under attack.

The government actions to eliminate Diversity, Equity and Inclusion have cost the jobs of many people, including at least one of our very own branch members. Our federal government has attempted to control free speech by limiting press access to the White House, removing historical events and honored people from federal websites, and even limiting words that can be used on those websites.

Mike Braun as the newly inaugurated governor of Indiana has written and implemented executive orders that are very similar in vein to the federal executive orders. He even went as far as to attend the executive order signing in Washington, D.C., that eliminates the U.S. Department of Education.

Real people are affected and real people are hurting. Our democracy of checks and balances on the three branches of power is being tested to the max, and I am angry. And grieved.

And left wondering, what can we do? What can I do, when I work full-time and have other responsibilities, so therefore limited time? Our State Public Policy Chair Bobbie Weikle has let us know about emailing your legislators and government officials, and here are some additional thoughts:

- 1) Stay informed and listen to several news sources. It's tough to hear and feels like the bad news can be relentless, but it's important that we all stay aware of what's happening on federal, state and local levels. If you can afford it, subscribe to a newspaper or donate to a public news outlet that follows the standard principles of independent journalism.
- 2) Do the AAUW Two-Minute Activist emails. It really is two minutes. They email you first, then you follow the directions to email your legislator. You can change any verbiage you want, or leave it as is. Sign up at www.aauw.org/act/two-minute-activist/.
- 3) Call your legislators. According to The New York Times, "a phone call can outweigh and email and far outweighs a Facebook post or a tweet." U.S. mailed letters can take too long to arrive and be relegated to pile in an office. Staffers answer the legislators' phone lines and they tally the responses- both live phone calls and emails. One fantastic resource on the federal level is <u>Scalls.org</u>. They find your legislators based on your address and feed their phone numbers to you. They keep a list of current topics that are relevant to Congress to help you stay organized. (If you have a similar resource on the state level, please let me know and I will share it-I haven't found one yet...)
- 4) Attend town halls- with or without our legislators. The local chapter of the group Indivisible, a pro-democracy activist group, recently held an "Empty Chair Town Hall," as none of our U.S. senators or our representative would attend. Hundreds of people attended and they ran out of space in their room at the library. The next one is planned for Sat., Apr. 19th, so watch for more details on that.

ONLINE REGISTRATION USING SIGN-UP GENIUS

We are excited to share that we are updating our online method of registering and paying for our events! We have been exploring different platforms, and for now, we will be using <u>Sign-Up Genius</u>. It is easy to use on both your phone and computer. This is an option for members who prefer to pay online. Checks and cash are accepted for those who prefer to register via snail mail!

How to Register using Sign-Up Genius

1. Go to the link listed in the Newsletter. It is case sensitive.

2. Once you're on the sign-up page, you'll see a list of available slots or registrations.

- 4. Click on "Sign-Up" next to <u>Guest</u> to register a guest, if you are bringing one. You can register up to 3 guests.

Library Announces "One County, One Book" Initiative Featuring Steve Inskeep

(FORT WAYNE, IN) – The Allen County Public Library (ACPL) is proud to announce its upcoming reading initiative, "One County, One Book", encouraging the community to read and engage with the thought-provoking book "Differ We Must: How Lincoln Succeeded in a Divided America" by Steve Inskeep. This initiative aims to unite people of all ages and backgrounds through a shared reading experience.

"Stories are powerful, and a community-wide reading initiative gives us the opportunity to focus on a single story with common themes for discussion. We are excited to be a catalyst for those conversations and a place where everyone knows they can share their ideas in the spirit of learning and connection," said ACPL Director of Special Collections Curt Witcher. "When sometimes it seems we are miles apart, stories can bring us together."

"One County, One Book" will welcome the book's author, Steve Inskeep, to Fort Wayne for a community discussion as part of the annual Friends of the Lincoln Collection McMurtry Lecture Series on October 9, 2025 at the Main Library.

In the book, Inskeep, a nationally known journalist and host of NPR's Morning Edition, explores the complex history and enduring influence of President Abraham Lincoln and his success uniting a divided nation. With insightful narratives and engaging storytelling, Inskeep delves into pivotal moments of Lincoln's life and invites readers to reflect on the values that shaped history and provides lessons for today.

As the caretakers of the Lincoln Financial Foundation Collection, one of the world's most comprehensive collections of Abraham Lincoln artifacts, and the curators of the Rolland Center for Lincoln Research, a world-class exhibit and Lincoln research facility – the ACPL chose a book focused on President Lincoln and invited not only the Friends of the Lincoln Collection, but also the ACPL Foundation and Friends of the Library to sponsor Inskeep as the keynote for the 2025 McMurtry Lecture.

In the leadup to October's McMurtry Lecture with Steve Inskeep, "One County, One Book" will include a variety of ways to engage with the story in the months to come including book discussions and offer programs across various ACPL branches.

The ACPL is encouraging individuals, educators, book clubs, social groups, faith groups, and more to consider the book for upcoming curricula/plans. The library is providing additional digital copies via the ACPL's digital library at no cost to patrons.
